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Line not the only factor to affect housing

Leading real estate lawyer JON MOWBRAY, a partner with Chesham law firm IBB solicitors, gives his views on comments from the new chairman of HS2 Ltd

HE new chairman of HS2, Sir David Higgins, has claimed that the railway will ease housing problems in London and the South East, as it will encourage people and businesses to locate themselves

in the Midlands and further north. He argues that the existence of a high-speed link into London will result in passengers being able to reside further away than the traditional commuter areas of Buckinghamshire

and the other Home Counties. Drawing on experiences in America and China, he considers that, with improved transport infrastructure companies, will be attracted to move away from the capital and take advantage of lower occupational and

employment costs. Whether his projection of a more balanced economy will become a reality, however, undoubtedly raises some scepticism.

In terms of housing, there are many factors aside from rail connectivity to London that support high prices in the South East.

Key among these is the lack of supply and recent government initiatives to stimulate the housing market, for example the Help to Buy schemes, do not directly secure increased development.

In Buckinghamshire, one would also point to factors such as proximity to major road networks and air hubs,

environmental factors and quality schooling as underpinning high prices. For business, there have already been signs over recent years that the very high rents in Central London have provoked

some corporates to move staff and sometimes their entire head office

operations outside the capital. However, it is difficult to envisage that HS2 alone would result in, for example, the banks, other major financial institutions and the professional firms that support them leaving the City.

As a result, it is unlikely that Sir David's claim will persuade those MPs who are not on side during what he acknowledges will be a challenging parliamentary process.


Its classes are held at the weekend at Dr Challoner's Grammar School, Chesham Road, Amersham.
